Lower Division News:

Welcome back to Term 4in lower division! We have jumped straight back into our learning with lots of exciting activities and hands-on experiences.

In Maths, students have been exploring money, learning to identify coins and notes, understanding their values, and engaging in basic addition. To make it even more fun, we played grocery shopping games, where students practiced adding prices and "buying" items from our class store. It's been a fantastic way for them to apply their learning to real-life situations!



For Writing, we've focused on narratives, using stories like The Deep Dark Woods and The Gruffalo to explore key features such as characters, settings, and plot. The students have had a wonderful time creating their own creatures, letting their imaginations run wild. This has helped them develop their understanding of story structure and build confidence in their writing.



In our Key Learning Area this term, K/1 students are diving into life cycles, with a special focus on chickens and ducks. So far, they have loved learning about the anatomy of these animals and discovering how they grow and develop from an egg. The students have shown great curiosity about the process and have been asking thoughtful questions during our discussions.

We are especially excited to announce that we are incubating our own duck eggs! The students are eagerly monitoring the eggs in the incubator, learning about the conditions required for them to hatch. We are all hopeful that, with a little luck, we will welcome some fluffy ducklings very soon!

It has been a fantastic start to the term, and we look forward to all the learning and growth still to come. Just a friendly reminder that Thursday is kitchen garden, students are asked to bring leather shoes to participate. Also could all reading folders please be returned to be updated for the term.

Middle Division News:

To say we are proud of our students on return to school this term is a huge understatement. From day one, we felt a calm and settled vibe across the school as students were eager to get into learning and be back at school. The attitude towards learning this term is extremely positive and all students are engaged to their full potential in their lessons. This week and last we have been discovering fractions in Middle Division and learning all about fractional parts, adding fraction parts to form a whole, missing fraction pieces, fractions on number lines, proper and improper fractions and some basic equivalent fractions using the fraction wall. We are on a roll with our daily warm ups, helping us to practise and consolidate our number sense, counting skills, times tables and some daily revision on questions we found tricky in NAPLAN and check in assessments this year.

Middle Division have followed the lead of Upper Division and are this term jumping on board with a new spelling program. So far we have very much been in the learning pit and trial phase, bother teacher and students ("Miss, I don't think you're doing this right...") but we are now beginning to find our rhythm and routine and it is already so pleasing to see the kids picking up new spelling skills. This fortnight our spelling rule is: if f,s,z or I follow a short vowel to end a word, we must double the last letter. Short vowels need protection. Eg: bell, spill, bliss, buzz, stiff, fizz, shell, floss. We have also extended to understand that this rule works when spelling with a k or ck; eg: chick, pick, duck; and ch or tch; eg: witch, switch, match.

Our writing tasks have been some creative writing activities around a story called The Dreamgiver. We have loved watching the visual story and using our writing skills to create a character description, character comparison and descriptive sentences. We have talked about adjectives, nouns, verbs, adverbs, prepositional phrases, similes and comparative conjunctions to support us in creating strong and descriptive sentences. Roald Dahl's beloved story "The BFG" is a story similar to the one we are currently studying, so we are enjoying that as our class novel this term. Time to sit and listen to a story is always peaceful and relaxing, as well as an enjoyable imaginative experience for all.

We are also learning, in our grammar lessons, about apostrophes of possession. We have been exploring the use of an apostrophe to show ownership and are careful not to use an apostrophe for plural words. For example, Middle Division's learning brains are on fire this term! See if your MD student can explain the use of apostrophe to you in this sentence.

During Term 4 we are completing an integrated unit titled "Diversity and Disasters" which will cover geography, science and PDHPE topics. So far we have done some mapping of Australia, continents and oceans of the world, as well as learning about tectonic plates and how their movement over millions of years have created the world and land masses we know now. Did you know: 225 million years ago, all land on Earth was connected and named as the supercontinent Pangaea?



Upper Division News:

In Weeks 1 and 2, Upper Division students have jumped straight into exciting learning across multiple subjects. This term, we're diving deep into word etymology, exploring the origins of words by studying base words, prefixes, and suffixes. By understanding how words are formed, students will enhance their spelling of more complex words and develop effective strategies for reading.



In Mathematics, we've been tackling equivalent fractions and learning how to add and subtract fractions with different denominators. Students are also making important connections between decimals, percentages, and fractions, which will strengthen their overall understanding of numbers.

Our integrated unit this term, titled "Diversity and Disasters," covers geography, science, and PDHPE topics. So far, students have been busy mapping Australia, the continents, and the oceans of the world. They've also begun exploring tectonic plates and how their movements over millions of years have shaped the landmasses we know today. Did you know that 225 million years ago, all the land on Earth was connected in a supercontinent called Pangaea?

Students are fascinated by how much our world has changed since then!

Stay tuned for more discoveries as we continue to delve into this rich and varied unit throughout the term.

Bushfire Danger Period Information for Parents and Carers

This brochure provides information for parents and carers about arrangements for the bushfire danger period.

The NSW Department of Education has engaged external experts to conduct assessments of all NSW government schools to identify schools at greater risk of impact from bushfires.

To support the health, safety and wellbeing of students and staff in your school, the department in consultation with NSW Rural Fire Service, will direct the school to temporarily cease operations on days when a Catastrophic Fire Danger Rating has been declared for your school's NSW Fire Area. Alternative learning arrangements will be put in place for these days.

In addition, schools may be made non-operational due to changing higher risk conditions and relevant advice from emergency services.

What is a Fire Danger Rating?

Fire Danger Ratings describe the potential level of danger should a fire start. The ratings are determined by a combination of factors including air temperature, relative humidity, wind speed and drought. The new Australian Fire Danger Rating System has four ratings; Moderate, High, Extreme and Catastrophic.

When will I know if my child's school has been made non-operational?

At approximately 4:00 pm each day the Fire Danger Rating is issued for the following day. This means that schools, including onsite preschools, will be notified after school hours that it will be non-operational the following day. Your school will notify you as soon as possible by the preferred method of communication.

Parents and carers are requested to:

- Provide up-to-date home and after-hours contact details to your school.
- Stay up-to-date with news and local media a through the bushfire danger period.

What education arrangements will be in place if the school is non-operational?

When non-operational, your school will advise of alternative learning arrangements, including any relocation or learning from home plans.
