Best Start

Best Start Kindergarten Assessment identifies student's literacy and numeracy skills on entry to kindergarten. All Kindergarten students complete the literacy and numeracy assessment in the first 5 weeks of school. It has been conducted in all NSW public schools since 2010. The assessment is mapped to the National Literacy and Numeracy Learning Progressions.

The assessment is conducted in line with existing school practices and builds upon teaching and learning programs that support students in the transition to school. Miss Whitechurch completed these assessments with our students in week 4 of this term and provided our kindergarten families with information regarding the student's achievements and goals moving forward. If you have any questions about Best Start, please come in for a discussion with your child's teacher or Miss Jackson.

Kindergarten Orientation 2025/26

I know it seems a long way in the future now, but we wanted to make sure our families had the information needed regarding Kindergarten Orientation. This way if families need to make changes to day care or preschool commitments they can be made confidently and early.

Orientation is a program conducted in all Public Schools to familiarise students beginning Kindergarten the following year with the new environment, their teachers and the school students who will be their future friends. At Murringo Public School this year we are planning five orientation days, three half days in term 3 and two full days in term 4. The dates are as follows:

Bus

Last week our students reviewed the school's expectations when travelling on the school bus. It was encouraging to see that all our students could articulate what these expectations were and why they were important. The review was conducted in response to two incidents that occurred on the bus earlier in the term so in addition to discussing our expectations with the students we thought it was important to share with them with our families and community so these expectations can also be discussed



and explored at home. Below is an excerpt from the policy from Transport NSW, Guidelines for Managing School Student Behaviour on Buses. The Code of Conduct for students, bus drivers, operators, school Principals and parents/guardians.

If you would like a copy of this document in full or have any questions about the school's expectations of students riding the bus, please contact your child's teacher or Miss Jackson.

Student Code of Conduct

The following Code of Conduct sets out acceptable standards of behaviour for students travelling on school buses and regular route buses. Students are expected to follow these rules for the safety and comfort of all passengers, including themselves. If the rules are not followed, it may lead to the withdrawal of travel passes for subsidised travel, banning students from travelling on buses, and even police prosecution and court action.

CODE OF CONDUCT FOR SCHOOL STUDENTS ON BUSES

It is every student's responsibility to behave in a manner that ensures the safety and comfort of passengers and drivers.

This includes: Behaviour on buses:

- \cdot Use appropriate language not offensive or racist language
- · Fighting, spitting, feet on seats, throwing things in or from the bus is not permitted
- \cdot No eating or drinking (other than water) unless for medical reasons or the bus operator gives written permission
- · Offer seats to adults including people with a disability, elderly or expectant mothers
- \cdot Do not touch, push or shove other people
- \cdot Do not bully or harass other passengers or the driver. This includes photographing, making lewd or suggestive comments, acting in a manner or participating in activities that may be deemed inappropriate or of a sexual nature.
- \cdot Avoid attracting the attention of the driver except in the case of emergency
- \cdot Do not play music at such volume that it may distract the bus driver or other passengers.

Safety on and near buses:

- · Obey reasonable directions from the driver (e.g. where to sit or to remain in the bus)
- · Remain in your seat do not move around the bus unnecessarily
- · If standing, remain behind the front passenger seat and keep a secure hand hold at all times
- \cdot Keep bags and other items clear of the aisle
- \cdot Do not allow any part of your body to protrude out of the bus at any time
- · Wait for the bus in a quiet and orderly manner including at bus interchanges
- · Stand away from the roadside until the bus comes to a complete stop
- \cdot Allow other passengers to leave the bus before stepping onto the bus in a single line
- \cdot Wait until the bus stops before moving to get off the bus at your designated stop
- \cdot Wait until the bus leaves the stop and you have clear vision before crossing the road

 \cdot Cross the road where and when it's safe to do so, use crossings/traffic lights where available.

Legal considerations on buses:

- \cdot Wear the seat belt properly adjusted and fastened
- \cdot Obey the law that bans smoking on buses
- \cdot Ensure that buses are not vandalised report any damage, e.g. graffiti and window etching, to the driver
- \cdot Do not interfere with bus property, equipment and signage
- \cdot Do not leave rubbish on the bus, or at bus stops or interchanges.

NAPLAN

The National Assessment Program – Literacy and Numeracy (NAPLAN) is a literacy and numeracy assessment that students in Years 3, 5, 7 and 9 sit each year. It is the only national assessment all Australian students can undertake. As students' progress through their school years, it is important to check how well they are learning the essential skills of reading, writing and numeracy. NAPLAN assesses the literacy and numeracy skills that students are learning through the school



curriculum and allows parents/carers to see how their child is progressing against national proficiency standards. NAPLAN is just one aspect of a school's assessment and reporting process. It does not replace ongoing assessments made by teachers about student performance, but it can provide teachers with more information about students' educational progress. NAPLAN also provides schools, education authorities and governments with information about how education programs are working, and whether young Australians are achieving important educational outcomes in literacy and numeracy.

Students are not expected to study for NAPLAN. You can support your child by letting them know that NAPLAN is a part of their school program and reminding them to simply do their best. Some explanation of NAPLAN is useful to help students understand and be comfortable with the format of the tests; however, it is not necessary for parents/carers to do this. Teachers will ensure students are familiar with the types of questions in the tests and will provide appropriate support and guidance.


The NAPLAN test window is 9 days. This is to accommodate schools that may not have the capacity to complete the tests in a shorter time frame. The NAPLAN test window starts on Wednesday 12 March 2025 and finishes on Monday 24 March 2025. Schools will schedule the tests as soon as possible within the testing window, prioritising the first week.

100 days of reading challenge

Our 100 days of reading challenge has kicked off with a fantastic start, congratulations to all our students who have already racked up 10 or more nights of reading that is a phenomenal start! Also very exciting to see several students take up the option of joining 'Reading Club' on Tuesdays and 'Thursdays', that is definitely the way to cement your place in our celebration of reading excursion.

Part of the reason we are so focused on developing our student's ability to read consistently is to build their reading stamina in our increasingly digital world. Our students need to know that they can read a text, whether that is a book, novel, informative text from start to finish successfully. I have included my top ten reasons to read for between 10 to 30 minutes at least 3 days a week.

Key benefits of sustained reading:

- Vocabulary expansion: Exposure to diverse texts introduces new words and enriches language understanding.
- **Critical thinking development:** Analysing different perspectives and ideas within a text encourages critical thought processes.
- Improved writing skills: Observing sentence structure and stylistic choices in reading improves writing quality.
- Stress reduction: Immersing oneself in a book can provide a calming and relaxing experience.
- Creativity boost: Imagining scenarios and characters within a narrative stimulates creativity.
- Enhanced concentration: Focusing on reading for extended periods improves attention span and focus.
- Better comprehension: Sustained reading allows for deeper understanding of complex concepts.
- Knowledge acquisition: Exposure to various topics through reading broadens general knowledge.
- **Mental well-being:** Reading can positively impact mental health by providing escape and emotional engagement.
- **We Live Longer!** Research has demonstrated that people who read regularly for leisure live between 4 to 6 years longer than people who do not.

So far, our students are doing a good job of maintaining their reading log to track their progress and results are being recorded in every class. If you need help with the reading logs or have any questions, please touch base with your class teacher.

For students who may not be able to read at home, we offer a Reading Club every Tuesday and Thursday where students can read with a teacher, and these sessions will count toward the 100 days of reading. At the end of the year, all students who complete the challenge will be rewarded with a fun end-of-year excursion! Keep going with the great reading! You have all made an excellent start.


